#### PARISH COUNCIL CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

Two significant things have happened on Church Green in Burston. Firstly, the village sign has been restored by Dale. The wooden sign has been rubbed down, filled with an enhanced filler and then carefully repainted. At the top of the sign it was suffering from some rot which has been repaired. The whole sign now looks as good as new! Our thanks go to Dale who gave his time for this project.

Secondly a War Memorial has been constructed on Church Green in Burston, to commemorate the eight men of the Parish who made the greatest sacrifice in The Great War. See more in our Memorial article.

The Strike Rally went off smoothly. There were fewer people attending than in some previous years, but there was a significant number of marshals. Inevitably some roads were blocked while the march was assembling and on the route round the candlestick, but the Green was left clear of all litter. The only problem was some cars parking on the grass verge in Rectory Road, and this will be addressed for next year.

The small fence in the playing field has now been repaired, and an insurance claim has been made, but the Parish Council have to pay the excess of £250. The Police have terminated their enquiries with no culprits having been identified.

The Council are beginning to consider the budget for next year. The current year's budget suggested a proposed expenditure to be greater than the income from the precept. This may become a regular occurrence as we no longer receive any regular funding from South Norfolk Council, as a consequence of them no longer receiving funding from central government. We do have some reserves that can be called on, but this problem will have to be addressed. Finally I wish all residents a Happy Christmas and Healthy New Year. Nigel Frankland



# PLAYING FIELD UPDATE

With winter fast approaching maintenance activities in the playing field are now starting to wind down but there are still a couple of matters to be resolved. Replacing the safety matting under the swings and at the bottom of the slide is one of these items and now the ground is a little softer we hope to get this done in the next couple of months. Also the balance log equipment requires one more post to be replaced and hopefully this can be addressed shortly.

We have managed to replace the broken timber fencing along the side of the parking area so the metal fencing around the play area is now again protected. Now the fencing is in place around the play area we are pleased to announce that the Parish Council are happy to approve of dogs on the playing field. Please can all dog owners clear up after their dogs and use the dog waste bins provided to ensure the playing field is kept clean and tidy for other users. We shall be reviewing the situation after six months to see that our request on clearing up dog waste is being followed.

Finally, those with keen eyes will have noticed that an area next to the small shed has been cleared of vegetation in preparation for the new B4RN broadband distribution cabinet that will serve the parish once the network is extended from just beyond Shimpling. Obviously when the work of installing the cabinet and the concrete base it sits on is underway we would ask all users of the playing field to keep clear of the work area especially those with young children.

# REMEMBRANCE

On November 7th 1919, King George V invited all his people in every part of the Empire to join him in a special celebration of the first anniversary of the end of WWI. "...it is my desire and hope that at the hour when the Armistice came into force...there may be, for the brief space of two minutes, a complete cessation of our normal activities...so that, in perfect stillness, the thoughts of everyone may be concentrated on reverent remembrance of the Glorious Dead". So on Tuesday 11/11/1919 at eleven o'clock, when clocks chimed, church bells rang and maroons (firecrackers) sounded, all trains and traffic in London stopped, people stood where they were and observed two minutes silence, most remembering their own loved ones, friends or neighbours. So started the annual tradition of Remembrance, now transferred to the first Sunday in November.

In Shimpling an oakwood tablet was put up in St George's church with names of the fallen, but not so in Burston which was still bitterly divided by the Burston School Strike. An unknown villager created a manuscript listing all 38 men who went to war and marking the names of the 8 who did not return. This is now on display in the church. A later, printed version hangs on the wall.

Now Burston has a permanent memorial on the Church Green, thanks to the Parish Council, chaired by Nigel Frankland, and many well-wishers and local businesses. Our Rector, Rev David Mills, led a service there on November 10th 2019, just 100 years after the first Remembrance Day. Norma Ajdukiewicz

#### **B4RN BROADBAND**

It may look as though nothing is happening on the project but there is a huge amount of planning being carried out by the Burston, Shimpling and Gissing volunteer team behind the scenes. The planning is the longest part of the project, digging relatively fast. We now have permission from the Parish Council to put the cabinet on the edge of the playing field near to the school. We are currently finalising the route from Moor Road, Shimpling, to the cabinet identifying any obstacles and getting the wayleave approval from the various land owners. If you haven't already done so please take advantage of the Government gigabit voucher scheme which is worth £1500/ household or £3500/ registered business towards the project. Find out more and register at b4rn.org.uk - get b4rn and follow the instructions. This is the only way that rural communities will get reliable broadband and keep our communities vibrantly going forward. The Tivetshall project is proceeding rapidly although the weather has held up digging recently. The line is also being dug to the Diss Business Park to help businesses improve their efficiency.

# **BURSTON WAR MEMORIAL**

More than 100 years after the end of The Great War (World War 1) our small village of Burston now has a War

For many years a Roll of Honour has been hanging in the church of St Mary, which lists the 38 men of the village who went to war, and indicates the eight who made the supreme sacrifice and never returned. The reason why there was no war memorial similar to those found in other villages is lost in the mists of time, but the fact that the famous Strike of pupils from the State school started in 1914, and the Strike School that still


🅊 stands by the village green today was built in 1917 may have had something to do with it. In a questionnaire that the Parish Council circulated in 2018 parishioners were asked if they thought that village should have a war memorial, and a lot of responses showed that there was support for this idea. A 'War Memorial Group' of three people was established, that investigated possible locations,

possible designs, and possible wording for the memorial tablet. It soon emerged that a position on Church Green would be ideal, as the memorial would be centrally located, and in a visible but not overly prominent position. One member of the working party, Nigel Frankland, saw a memorial in the woods near Knettishall Heath, which consisted of a simple brick plinth, with a flint panel inlay, and having a sloping engraved stone on the top at about waist height. Another member of the working party came up with the idea of a cupboard, to be built into the plinth, similar to those found at the War Grave Commission Cemeteries on France and Flanders which could contain a book giving details of those who died, and those who served.

After some discussion it was agreed that the inscription should give the name, rank, regiment, serial number, date of death for each of the Burston men, and details of where each casualty fought, and where they are commemorated by the War Graves Commission. It turned out that only 2 of the 8 had known graves, and the rest were on memorials such as the Thiepval Memorial.

An initial appeal led to some residents and businesses promising financial support, and at this stage Cyril Bromley, a retired architect who lives in the village was drawing up plans, and an estimate for an engraved stone had been obtained, but there was still a way to go to reach the target necessary to start building works. James Easter, the local Councillor on the South Norfolk Council then indicated that his Council had some funding that would be distributed soon, and suggested that if there was an application there would be a good chance that the promises of funding that the group had would be matched by South Norfolk Council. To make the application more formal the working party joined forces with the Parish Council, and in September it was confirmed that a substantial grant had been awarded which made the project viable. However, there were only six weeks to Remembrance Day! It was decided that this was just enough time to get memorial built. The wording for the stone was finally agreed and Bierton and Woods were commissioned to make it. Tommy Bloomfield, a local builder, was asked to build the plinth, and mount the stone, and erect a surrounding fence and a new flagpole. The plinth is built of red brick, with a grey gravel surround. In the front of the plinth is

a stainless steel cupboard, made by the apprentices of Wavenys (known to many as Waveny Pumps Limited). The rear of the plinth is provided with a flint inlay panel in the form of a cross, and the flints have been taken from local fields, and more of these flints have been incorporated in the centre of the plinth. Probably many of the men named on the memorial worked in the fields where these flints were collected. Work started on Church Green in October, and the stone, a black polished granite slab with silvered engraving, was mounted on the plinth on Friday 8th November, just two days before Remembrance Day. At 8 am on Sunday 10th November a large number of residents were by the new memorial to observe a silence, to lay wreaths and flowers, and to hear the names of those who died read out. The ceremony was led



The whole project has been a tremendous team effort. In addition to the funding from South Norfolk Council funding has come from local residents and the Army. Jewsons in Diss have provided building material free of charge, and forFarmers, who run Burston Mill, provided the oak posts and chains for the surrounding fence. Peter Rees has undertaken a lot of research into the 8 men who

died, and has produced the book that is now in the cupboard in the memorial. For some of the dead he has found photographs, and details of where they lived, and the battles that they fought in. This book will be expanded as the months go by and more information emerges, and there will also be details of the thirty men who served and then returned after the war. Now that we have a new flag pole we must decide on suitable days to fly flags, either the Union Jack or St George's flag. There are a number of commemorative days but perhaps you have other suggestions. If so please let us know.
