PARISH COUNCIL CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

We have not had an issue of The Parish Planet since February this year. It is strange looking back at that issue.....not a single mention of Virus, or Covid, social distancing, quarantine, or lock-down, but several articles about forthcoming events, none of which actually happened.

In the last six months there has been a lot of change, and the villages have responded tremendously to the situation. In response to a leaflet drop across the whole Parish in the days before lock-down a host of people volunteered to shop and collect prescriptions for those who were isolating. Mike Warwick, our Emergency Co-Ordinator put the volunteers in touch with those who needed help, so that no-one who needed it was left unsupported.

But the response from the village was much greater than the provision of a team of volunteers. Suzie Silva, from Audley Close, had been helping Andrea Owen, our Community Co-ordinator from the South Norfolk Council Help Hub, especially organising the upcycling of many items – collecting unwanted items from those who no longer needed them (cots and high chairs for example) and delivering them to new owners who would appreciate them. At the beginning of lock-down Suzi extended her activities in the community, and on her own initiative set up a food bank, persuading Morrisons to donate supplies, and also persuading Pastor Sam to let the foodbank be arranged in the Chapel. Suzi opens the foodbank when it is needed, and delivers food to those who are unable to leave their homes.

The Burston Crown also provided a very positive response to the new situation, opening a convenience store that stocks basic items such as milk, flour, eggs, tea, coffee, butter, pasta, biscuits, and also providing a takeaway service for meals. Steve and Steve-aroo enable items from the shop, and hot meals, to be delivered to homes in our villages. Major efforts were made to enable the pub to open as safely as possible as soon as possible, with a row of colourful beach huts now providing individual private dining rooms for up to six people. The Parish Council responded to the lock down by having the first parish council meeting by email, but later council meetings have been on Zoom, which enables the councillors to see and hear each other, and enables members of the public to attend the meeting.

Of course, there has also been a lot of help provided by friends and neighbours on a friendly and neighbourly basis, as one would expect in a community such as ours, and I am sure that everyone is still looking out for any people living close to them who are known to be vulnerable.

There is still a degree of uncertainty as to the future, but if we, as a community, continue to pull together and help each other I am sure that we will all get through it in the end.

PLAYING FIELD UPDATE

The last six months has been one of the most unusual times for us all but even though we have had to temporarily close some of the facilities in the playing field we have kept the maintenance of the grass, hedges and orchard going in readiness for when the restrictions are lifted.

The playing field is looking as good as I've seen it and that's thanks to our new grass cutting contractor, Alan Page, who is keeping the field and community orchard areas looking pretty good, I think you will agree. Our caretaker, Hadleigh, is looking after the play area grass and some hedges and again he is doing a grand job. Unfortunately early in the pandemic crisis we had to close the play area, zip wire equipment, and BMX track to comply with Government requirements. We have now been able to reopen these facilities along with easing the

comply with Government requirements. We have now been able to reopen these facilities along with easing the restrictions on the use of the BMX track but again trying to follow the guidelines wherever possible. New signs will be going up shortly advising users of these facilities what should be done to limit the spread of COVID-19. In essence we are asking users, in particular parents, to apply social distancing where possible and to use personal hand sanitizers or hand wipes at all times, especially when using the play equipment. These new signs will be in place shortly. We ask all villagers to read and apply these guidance rules for their own safety.

You will notice now that a new green cabinet has appeared in the playing field and this is the network distribution cabinet for the B4RN broadband system that will shortly be brought into the village. There is an update elsewhere in this edition on what will be happening in the coming weeks and months.

The parish council are always looking at ways to make the playing field more accessible to parishioners and we are now considering building an all-weather footpath around the perimeter of the field which will give easy access from Audley Close to the school and carpark area, link the footbridge that comes into the field from Gissing Road to the community orchard and bench at the bottom of the field. There is a plan below of what we are planning and we would like to know your thoughts on this proposal so please let me know what you think. Lets hope that shortly we shall all be returning to some sort of normal but until then rest assured we shall carry on looking after the playing field as best we can. Keith Cowley

THE DON SWANTON AWARD



On a very hot morning villagers gathered on Burston village green to celebrate Tommy Bloomfield, a life-long resident of Burston, to congratulate him on being awarded the Don Swanton Award 2020. It was good to see so many people turn up to support him. The presentation would normally be made at the Annual Parish Meeting but, following Covid 19 precautions, it was held outdoors with social distancing being maintained.

Tommy Bloomfield has carried out numerous good deeds which have enhanced the neighbourhood.

There is hardly a village amenity that Tommy has not been involved with or helped to maintain. He has cleared pathways and communal areas, he has assisted in improvements and maintenance of the Playing Field and the BMX

track and has even built a bridge over the ditch to enable villagers to access the area safely.
In 2018 he provided a Christmas tree for Burston Village Green. That, however, was only the beginning of his work of the Village Green. He played a major and essential role in the creation of the War Memorial. The War Memorial is a fitting tribute to the fallen and the



village owes this man a debt of thanks for his works in ensuring its creation. As one villager said "the memorial was completed and ready for the Remembrance Day Service...but only because of the sterling efforts of Tommy".

It was therefore particularly appropriate that Tommy was presented with the Don Swanton Award at the War Memorial site which is a lasting testament to his good work.

B4RN

Great news for our villages, at last the cabinet has been installed in the Burston playing fields and the rail crossing has been completed. The Burston and Shimpling team has been working very hard behind the scenes to prepare for this time. What have we been doing? Planning routes, obtaining wayleaves from all the relevant landowners, learning the various B4RN systems such as mapping & the customer relations management database and being trained on fitting house kits, splicing, blowing fibre and digging ducting in people's gardens in Shimpling.

We are now ready to build the network so if you want to learn new skills, meet new people and generally help the community to get the fastest rural broadband in the country get involved.

If you had been sceptical that the project was never going to get off the ground, it now has so please sign up for a gigabit voucher funded by the Government to get world class broadband to rural communities to help

them thrive. Go to b4rn.org.uk GET B4RN and put in your postcode and follow the instructions. It is a great opportunity to invest and get 5% return, if you invest £1500 or more you will get a free connection worth £150. The team is Jane & Brian Fishwick, Jim & Lynn Howard, Alison Wakeham and Chris Humphreys. 
BURSTON HOUSE HOSPITAL NEWS


