# **COMMUNITY KITCHEN**



The Parish Council's decision to enforce 'No Parking' to protect church green has proved to be controversial. Volunteers for the Burston Community Kitchen project felt the Parish Council's action was particularly detrimental to them as many of the participants have used the green for parking because there is minimal space next to the Strike School. The church green has been used as an overspill parking area for years. However the law states that parking isn't permitted on a registered green without the landowner's permission. A misunderstanding on both sides meant that the Community Kitchen were unaware they had been officially notified of the 'No Parking' arrangements and were therefore concerned when participants were cautioned by the parish council at one of their sessions. Having run for over a year with no apparent damage inflicted on the green, the

Community Kitchen wonders why the Parish Council feels it is necessary to bring this matter to the fore now. At the Parish Council meeting on 22nd November, the community kitchen was well represented. A supporter said the Parish Council had underestimated the feelings of villagers. The Parish Council said that since March it had become evident that regular parking took place on the green due to the success of the Community Kitchen Project who they said, had been informed that parking was not permitted (the Community Kitchen were unaware of this). The law says parking on a village green is not permitted and the Parish Council are obliged to follow the law. The Community Kitchen have corresponded with the Parish Council setting out their assessment of the law and requesting that the Parish Council considers their request to allow parking in the future. The council says they are seeking advice from other organisations and once received, consideration will be given to this request. Christine Stevens

#### VILLAGE LITTER PICK

On 14th October 2023, a dry and sunny morning, sixteen volunteers kindly picked up discarded litter from the roadside verges and public spaces in Burston and Shimpling. Although a thorough search took place, I am delighted to report that less rubbish was bagged up for collection by the council than is usual. Being the optimist that I am, I was hopeful that it was a sign that people were less inclined to throw their rubbish out of their car as they drive through the villages. This optimism was short lived as I travelled through Shimpling the very next day and saw discarded fast-food wrappers in the road by the turning for St George's Church. Our volunteers' efforts are still clearly necessary so please turn up at Church Green next April!

Once again we enjoyed a pleasant chat, coffee, cake and the now famous sausage rolls after our litter gathering. All your efforts are very much appreciated as I know that many of you reading this always keep the area around your home neat and tidy as well as regularly picking up litter when you walk around the villages and use the public footpath routes. Doing this helps to keep drains, ditches and watercourses free from items that snag on vegetation and prevent the free flow of water that adds to the risk of flooding.

#### HEADING IN TO WINTER AT THE RECREATION GROUND

After the successful picnic event organised in late summer, the recreation park is moving into its winter maintenance period although there is not a lot to do over the coming months with the last grass cut now done and dusted, the wildflower bund cut and the community orchard trees now beginning to drop their leaves. One issue that we will need to address, probably in the spring, is the grass that is creeping onto the footpath, this will be sprayed to push it back from the path edge and will necessitate the park being closed for at least 24hours. We will of course give advanced notice of when this will be carried out.

A survey has been carried out of the tree saplings planted over the last two years and we now know how many need to be replaced. Fortunately, the Woodland Trust is donating trees for us to plant this coming winter. A call for volunteers will be put out once we have a date when the trees will be available. The Portaloo toilet has been removed for the winter but will hopefully be back next year if funds allow, ready for the spring and summer. As noted above the community orchard trees are now beginning to lose their leaves but not before they provided a crop of meddlers, apples, pears, plums and quinces for local residents to harvest.

We have a further rubbish bin to install on the far side of the meadow area and some fencing alongside the basketball post to prevent balls going in the ditch. Plans are for both of these to be done by next spring.

Sadly there have been further reports of dog pooh being left in the park and we would again ask dog walkers to clear up after their pets. There are posters around the park reminding people to use the provided dog litter bins. We have also installed a sign to remind people that overnight parking is not permitted in the car park which is for the use of the school staff and parents plus visitors to the school, the park and the village green.

As the park goes into its winter mode we will make sure that come next spring the meadow area will be coming alive with flowers, the playing field area will be ready for football, etc and all the footpaths will be clear to enjoy the whole recreation area. #### **GRAVE CONCERN**

Nestled within the conservation area at the heart of Burston is a hidden gem which many people drive or walk past daily. It caused a social media storm during the summer because it, along with several other similar sites, had been badly neglected; if you believed what was reported on local social media groups. Let me just put that reporting in context for you, if you haven't recently walked around the churchyard I urge you to do so now, as a lot has changed in recent weeks and I hope to gain your



support to continue with maintaining this final resting place for many of our villagers.

Burston's population from the 2021 census is 582, of which 327 are aged 18-64 and 161 aged over 65; 52% Christian, 47% no religion. Why have I mentioned this? Because I am appealing for twenty people to commit to adopting just six headstones each. If you do the 'math' that would be 120 headstones, the approximate number on the west side and rear of the church. Please note the word 'headstones' as grass cutting is a less important, although necessary, maintenance issue that will be dealt with separately.

During October the 'Conservation Scheme Area' was scythed and cleared. This part of the churchyard is left undisturbed as part of the Norfolk Wildlife Trust's 'Saving Norfolk Wildlife for the Future' scheme and as such has an abundance of primroses, wild flowers and grasses which proliferate through spring and summer. (Look for the plaque on the right of the path as you walk from the gate to the church porch.)

To the left of the path are more recent graves and this area is the one which needs more regular attention, especially on the boundary with the Strike School. This year most of these graves had become inaccessible and invisible, a fault which has now been rectified due to those remarks that struck a real chord with me; an incomer to the village. I thought that, like me, many residents might have tended their relatives' graves before moving away or retiring here from another part of the country leaving that responsibility to someone else. Wouldn't it be worthwhile to reciprocate this task here in our village? Perhaps our elderly residents dearly wish they were able to tend their loved one's grave but ill health or frailty prevent them. This is where those 20 people could make a community commitment to help whilst enjoying fresh air, gentle exercise and the sounds of nature around them.

If you have a pair of garden shears, a soft brush and a little time on your hands to keep a few headstones visible please contact me, Angela Belgrove angela@burstonandshimpling.org.uk or telephone 01379 741534. If you regularly tend a grave and do not need this help, make contact and I will ensure the volunteers leave this to you to continue to do. Some of you may already know me through my work on the Parish Council as Litter Warden and with the Don Swanton award but this appeal is through my link as a regular member of St Mary's congregation and member of the Parochial Church Council. I hope to hear from twenty of you soon. Angela Belgrove.

# **DITCHES AND WATERCOURSES - FLOOD MITIGATION WORK IN SHIMPLING**

Following the severe flooding that occurred in the parish in 2019/2020, the parish council have been pressing various government agencies to undertake flood mitigation works in and around the two villages. After a long slog we are pleased so advise that the works planned by the Water Land Management Alliance, which incorporates the old local drainage boards, are about to commence in land to the north of Pug Street in Shimpling on the watercourse that runs parallel to Moor Road. Additional works will be carried out by the bridge opposite The Grange on the Dickleburgh Road. These works are being carried out by the Environmental Agancy under the auspices of the WLMA and should be completed by the end of the year. We will of course monitor the progress of these works and regularly report back to the residents.

The WLMA plans also included works to the north of Shimpling but as yet the EA as not authorised funding for these to begin. We will be pushing the EA, WLMA and others to include these works in next years budgets as the WLMA plans need to be carried out in their entirety.


## YOUTH CAFE
